## HOUSING FOR ALL \* PRIORITY

#### Housing Development Program

#### A Unique & Creative Collaboration

With a pledge of \$4 million from IWF, the city of Council Bluffs created a housing development program that addresses the housing crisis in creative ways.

• THE GOAL: 1,300 units over the next 10 years Funds can be used for land acquisition, infrastructure, or developer incentives to create multi-family or single-family housing.

#### Homeowner Repair Program

#### Habitat for Humanity

- THE GOAL: Maintain valuable housing stock and home values in our community.
- IMPACT: A sense of pride in home ownership, neighborhood beautification, and owners stay in the place they call home.

HOUSING

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#### Iowa Legal Aid

Before Iowa Legal Aid established the Eviction Diversion Desk with a grant from the IWF, Pottawattamie County had one of Iowa's highest eviction rates.

• THE GOAL: Provide free legal assistance to help residents of Pottawattamie County avoid eviction and potential homelessness and make sure property owners receive payment.

• THE IMPACT: Helped **443 people** in one year, with **94%** achieving positive outcomes. Reduced community burden by preventing evictions and lessening the need for emergency shelters.

**Property owners get paid;** Tenants stay.

## **EDUCATION WITH PURPOSE**

#### Preschool

#### **Green Hills Area Education Agency**

With the support of IWF funding of \$16 million over the past 18 years, GHAEA has provided high-quality preschool programming for 4-year-olds throughout Pottawattamie County. Kindergarten readiness has a positive effect on third-grade reading ability, high school graduation rates, and future achievement outcomes.

In one year, **86 percent of kindergartners met the fall** benchmark for the early literacy screening in Pottawattamie's Early Childhood Iowa (ECI) area, ranking 1st among all 38 areas.



#### Workforce Education

RAINING The new initiative provides a total of \$1.1 million to six school districts, Avenue Scholars of Southwest Iowa, and Iowa Western Community College to support and prepare the **next generation** of workers for in-demand careers. Each program ensures students receive support in their career exploration and assistance in transitioning to additional training.
